NJDOT Commissioner and NJTA Chair Diane Gutierrez- But I had a great career at the New Jersey Turnpike Au-Scaccetti was introduced as the next President of the International Bridge, Toll and Tunnel Association at the organi-

zation's annual meeting in Anaheim, California, on Oct. 12th. She will be the fourth New Jersey transportation official to hold the post, joining former New Jersey Turnpike Authority Executive Director William Flanagan (1974) and former New Jersey Highway Authority Executive Directors D. Louis Tonti (1958) and George Zilocchi (1991).

As most of you know, the Commissioner's ties to the New Jersey Turnpike Authority run much deeper than the four years she has served as chair of the board. She began her career in tolling and transportation here and spent 21 years in positions of increasing re-



thority."

To mark the occasion of her appointment as President of

IBTTA, Commissioner Gutierrez-Scaccetti agreed to spend some time talking to Crossroads about her career here, about the proper role of tolling in the overall transportation system, and about the value of actively participating with IBTTA.

CROSSROADS: Were you expecting to spend most of your adult life in transportation when you came to work at the Turnpike Authority?

COMMISSIONER: "I thought I was going to be bored to tears. I didn't want to talk about concrete and pavement all the time. As soon as I opened my mind and was willing to see how much really gets done

"I always refer to the New Jersey Turnpike as my career," she said. "I had a great job in Florida (as the head of the Florida Turnpike Enterprise). I have a great job at DOT.

A deserving honor for one of our own

Colleagues -

I hope you will join me in congratulating Commissioner Diane Gutierrez-Scaccetti on becoming President of the International Bridge, Tunnel and Turnpike Association. It's a big deal. She is only the fourth New Jersey tolling agency executive to fill the role in the 89-year history of IBTTA.

the foundation of so much that we do, and probably the most taken-for-granted service that government provides. People just expect it's always going to be available. We don't get up in the morning, getting ready for work and say, 'Geez, I hope I'm going to be able to use the Turnpike from 7A to 9.' We just assume it's wide open and ready and waiting for us. That isn't always true, I know. But we just take it for granted that it will be available. If we could ever win an Oscar in this business, it wouldn't be for best actor. It would be for best supporting actor. We're always in the background making sure that things work."

She graduated from the university of Connecticut and worked in Mercer County and New Jersey state government. After she completed her master's degree at the Rutgers School of Management and Labor Relations, she accepted a position with IBM and relocated to North Carolina. A few years later, in 1989, she was offered a job at portant NJTA initiatives of the past three decades. She left for a few years to run the Florida Turnpike Enterprise, but returned to become NJDOT Commissioner after Gov. Murphy's election. She has served as chair of the NJTA board since she returned.

In her role as President, of the organization, Commissioner Gutierrez-Scaccetti will have a seat at the table for the important conversations about laws and policies affecting the operation of toll roads and about the role tolling will play in the revitalization of America's transportation infrastructure. She will have an opportunity to talk about New Jersey's successes and challenges and to share her transportation vision with a wider audience.

We should all be proud that one of our own has stepped onto the international stage.

the Turnpike Authority and decided to return home. She was hired as a management specialist, but the job title was eventually changed to contract administrator.

<u>CROSSROADS</u>: Can you tell us what you remember about your first day on the job?

<u>COMMSISSIONER:</u> "One of the memories that will stay with me forever is [current Human Resources Director] Meg Garrity extending her hand in friendship. She said, 'Let me show you how to get around here.' She literally showed me how to get out of the old building on 18 north or south to get food or to get to the stores. It was not easy to figure out on your own. I always appreciated Meg extending herself that way. What I learned over the years is that's just who Meg is. She's a really good soul."

Commissioner Gutierrez-Scaccetti spent 13 years in the front office at the Turnpike Authority serving as executive assistant, chief of staff, and deputy ED under five executive directors — Frank Holman, Donald Watson, Roger

Nutt, Edward Gross, and Michael Lapolla.

Her memories of those years run the gamut from the care -free days of employee picnics at Tall Cedars in Crosswicks and 50th anniversary antique car parades and the dark days when tragedy struck friends and valued colleagues. "Strong memories can be both good and sad. We had some very sad days as an organization. But what I remember most about them is the Turnpike pulling through as a family."

<u>**CROSSROADS:**</u> What accomplishments are you proudest of from your years at NJTA?

<u>COMMISSIONER</u>: "I think we did a lot of good work. We did a lot of charitable work. We did a lot of great transportation work. We raised an incredible amount of capital for an extraordinarily aggressive capital plan. There really are few places I go where someone doesn't mention the difference the 6 to 9 widening made. To us, it's like, 'Hey no big deal,' but to the person who uses it day in and day out we gave them three or four hours of their lives back every week, especially in the summer. It was a very big deal."

After Commissioner Gutierrez-Scaccetti retired from the NJTA in 2010, she took a job as executive director of Florida's Turnpike Enterprise.

<u>CROSSROADS</u>: When you left the New Jersey Turnpike in 2010 and took the job in Florida, were you expecting to come back here one day?

<u>COMMISSIONER</u>: "There was never a day in my life when I would have told you I'd be coming back to New Jersey. But when I got the call to come up to New Jersey and meet with the Governor about the job -- and when I got the call from the call from the Governor offering me the job – I was open to the possibility. As much the job was phenomenal, it was really about having the opportunity to come home and help take care of my mom, having a job that would allow me to continue to support my children, to see them through school, to see them get settled and on their own. It happened to be I got to do a job I loved while taking care of the people I loved."

She had been involved with IBTTA when she worked here but her involvement became much deeper when she was in Florida. That's when she joined the IBTTA board of directors.

CROSSROADS: What inspired your involvement?

<u>COMMISSIONER</u>: "If you want the opportunity to have a voice, you have to be willing to invest some of your own time. You do the IBTTA job because you want to be part of a process that guides the industry. You will not always be successful, but you know you will have your voice heard.

"IBTTA is a phenomenal place for leaders at all levels in tolls to get together. There's a huge networking component – not networking for a new job, but networking with your peers to learn how they do things in different parts of the country. Why does California have this series of express lanes? Do they really work? Or why is Texas set up the way it is – why does TexDOT run basically the tolling operation and tag distribution. How are they set up and why? What can we learn from that? It's great to be able to interact with other agencies across the country, to know people so when you have a question you can pick up the phone and you can talk something through with a peer, whether it be from Maine or California. "

The IBTTA president serves a one-year term. Commissioner Gutierrez-Scaccetti's term begins in January 2022.

<u>CROSSROADS</u>: What do you see as the important issues facing the tolling industry as you begin your term as IBTTA president?

<u>COMMISSIONER</u>: "Certainly, the issue of being at the table on infrastructure is important. We need to make sure people understand the power the toll roads have to support the overall transportation infrastructure. We have a great opportunity to do that now as they continue to debate transportation funding at the federal level. It's important that we help the federal gov-

ernment understand the phenomenally strong impact toll roads can have on our transportation system generally. You see that here in New Jersey with the power of the toll roads to help us stand up better transit."

<u>CROSSROADS</u>: In what way is transit linked to the highway system?

<u>COMMISSIONER</u>: "At the end of the day, we don't have a lot of room left to build roads. We don't have a lot of room left to make them bigger. So we need people to find other modes, and we need to support other modes basically for our own success. We can make sure trains and buses are running the way they should, and we can make sure transit has a capital planning process that is predictable, and that people develop confidence in. That certainly makes a lot more room for our commercial customers, who are a key to our economy. It helps us reduce congestion. It's better for the environment. "

<u>**CROSSROADS</u>**: Do you believe we're at a point in our history when we will never build or expand a highway again?</u>

<u>COMMISSIONER</u>: We are going to be some laying pavement. I say that to every environmentalist who tells me we should never pave another lane —we're going to do that from time to time. The 1 to 4 widening (on the Turnpike) is a good example. They argue with me about that, and my response always is it will

take one jackknifed tractor trailer to shut that part of the road down for five or six hours with people stuck behind it and not being able to get out. Sadly, because it's so narrow and the tractor trailers are so big, a crash down there can straddle both sides of the road, so the impact is on traffic in both directions. That widening is needed. We need to get trucks out of the left lane, and we need to create that capacity. But it probably will be the last major widening we do."

A Boy, His Dogs, and the Trooper who Kept Them Out of Harm's Way

If not for Trooper Jamarr Morris, this might have been a tragic story about a boy and the run-away dogs he loved enough to chase into traffic on the Garden State Parkway. "It happened so abruptly. In law enforcement, it's about being that helping hand, especially when you see a child in that situation. My first thought was to preserve life. There were a few cars that were passing me, but most of the cars had stopped by that point.

But because Trooper Morris was on the Parkway on his way to the Holmdel Station on the August day when the boy chased his dogs into the road, and because Trooper Morris acted decisively and bravely, that tragedy was averted, the wandering dogs were reunited with the panicked boy, and the panicked boy was reunited with his grateful parents.

The saga of Trooper Morris's heroics that day was picked up by the news media. If you haven't seen it already, we highly recommend you watch the story Brian Thompson of Channel 4 did on the incident. "It was clear for me to reverse safely as far as I could and I was able to get close to the boy. As I approached him, he was still struggling to hold onto the two dogs – one by a leash and the other by its collar.

"It was a very difficult situation as the dogs were barking a lot and trying to get away from the boy and get into the express lanes. I was trying to grab one of the dogs as best as possible. The dog was barking loudly at me and all I could think was I'm either going to grab this dog and get bit or it's going to run into traffic. We were fi-

"I was headed to the State Police barracks and saw out of the corner of my eye in the grass area in the shoulder a child chasing after two dogs," the Trooper said. "The boy was coming up to where the guardrail was ending and very close to the road. nally able to get both dogs into my car with the boy.

"It was such a great moment with motorists stopping. It was the first situation in my career where there were so many regular civilians jumping out to help. Just to see everybody come together at that moment, it was a really spectacular event to witness and be a part of.

same thing any New Jersey State Trooper would do in that moment.

"On my way back to the boy's house to drop him off with his parents, I saw a couple people walking around the woods near the Parkway looking for the boy. By that time, there was a whole group of people from his father and mother and neighbors looking for the boy and his dogs. When I spoke with the father he was appreciative, scared and had no clue that the boy made it all the way to the Parkway with his dogs." Trooper Morris joined Troop D just this year. He's a seven-year veteran of the NJSP. He previously served with Troop C in Hamilton, Bordentown, and at the New Jersey State House.

We're glad Trooper Morris has received some recognition for his actions that day — it is well deserved — but we take him at his word when he says any other New Jersey State Trooper would have done the same. Our partners at the New Jersey State Police are the best at what they do. We see them do extraordinary things on our roadways nearly every day.



TOLL ROAD HISTORY

An Archive Room Story ...

In May 1991, the Turnpike Authority broke ground on a project that would widen the Turnpike by adding a lane to the outer roadway in each direction between Interchanges 11 and 14.

Ernest Cerino Sr., now 91 years old, was at the groundbreaking that day.

Ernest by then had spent 36 years at the Turnpike Authority, first as a master electrician, then as a superintendent of the Central building trades. He would retire later in 1991.

For the groundbreaking, the Central Trades Carpenter Shop in Hightstown had made ceremonial shovels. They were painted silver and outfitted with plaques to note the date and the occasion.

"Dignitaries broke ground and when the ceremony was over one of the bosses told a group of employees they could take the shovels home as souvenirs," said Ernest's son, Ernie Cerino Jr.

Thus one of the shovels has been hanging ever since in the Cerino family garage. Ernie Jr. contacted the Authority this summer and offered to give it back.

"It is time the shovel found its way back home," he said. "The shovel

does not belong to us - it belongs to the Turnpike organization and its rich history. Our father, and the entire family are so happy it found its way back to where it belongs!"

The shovel has joined other ceremonial shovels from over the years in the archive room on the 4th floor of the headquarters building.


